Inspite of downward pressure on rates, NAFA Cash Fund was able to meet our benchmark commitment and offered a return of approximately 10% to its investors.

This had an immediate impact on the liquidity and consequently 1-month KIBOR rose by 126 basis points, whereas 6-month KIBOR rose by 112 basis points. This will have a positive impact on the performance of the fund going forward as many of our investments are KIBOR-linked. CFS and RFS rates also rose significantly following this event, as these rates carry a certain risk premium over KIBOR. A large chunk of funds from national events are appreciate to be released event.			
Asset Allocation		saving schemes are expected to be released soon, which could bring the interest rates marginally down. However, in the long run, we believe that the KIBOR will sustain the present level.			
Term Finance Certificates (13%) (32%)		CFS and RFS rates have risen from a low of 12.50% in June to 14.70% at present. We expect this increase to continue gradually. Also, CFS MK II is expected to be implemented by end-August, which will improve our return as mutual funds will be allowed to provide their own margins.			
CFS (37%) Ca	Spread Transactions (12%) ash & Equivalents (6%)	NCF investment in TFCs has risen from 4% in June to 13% in July, which should improve the Fund's performance going forward. The NAFA Cash Fund's investment in TFCs is based on floating rates, linked to KIBOR and the present trend in interest rates will further enable us to improve our performance in future. We would like to further increase our investment in TFCs to approximately 20% of the fund size as and when good opportunities arise.
